On Monday 24th November, 2014, Dr Nicky Hudson, Professor Lorraine Culley, Dr Cathy Herbrand and Miss Jessica Davies from De Montfort University, along with Professor Guido Pennings and Dr Veerle Provoost from Ghent University in Belgium and Dr Vincenzo Pavone from CSIC in Spain,
