

Impact of academic regulations changes on students taking a leave of absence or reassessments with attendance during in 2023/24

Students who should be entering level 6 in 2023/24 but who will be taking a break from their normal study pattern during 2023/24 will return into new regulations when they enter level 6 in 2024/25. They may also return into a new curriculum structure. This includes students who take a leave of absence from their studies or who are required to take reassessments with attendance at teaching activities during 2023/24. The below provides a highlight of the key changes to the academic regulations which will impact on level 6 in 2024/25. For further information please see the [current level 4 regulations](#).*

Section 1: Study

Section 3: Progression through the programme of study

Please note, the below applies only to students who have not yet completed level 5. Students may progress to a placement having achieved 90 credits but may have module failures/deferrals in the other 30 credits. In such cases, students must meet the requirements of the new regulations in order to progress to level 6, and the exceptional/discretionary progression regulation will not apply.

125	The Associate Dean (Academic) or nominee may exceptionally approve longer extensions of up to 10 university working days from the date of an already approved extension deadline. A further extension request form with timely supporting evidence (covering the current extension period) should be submitted by the student to the module leader, who will seek the approval of the Associate Dean (Academic) or nominee. The outcome will be communicated to the student by the module leader. If approved, regulation 124 applies. If not approved there is no right to appeal the decision		
141	The university will only consider requests from students to repeat their level of study in very extenuating circumstances. A repeat year opportunity, if agreed, may only be offered once.	N/A	There is no option to repeat a level of study
