


# Linguistic discrimination

- is unfair treatment which is based on use of language and characteristics of speech, including first language, accent, size of vocabulary (whether the speaker uses complex and varied words), modality, and syntax.
- Name discrimination is discrimination based on someone's name.

#### Introducing Linguicism: Brief History

- Colonisation gave rise to a language hierarchy (Brenzinger 1992).
- Naming practices by European colonisers served to inject a sense of shame and legacy of inferiority. (Eames 2019).
- Colonisers assigned new names or even left people nameless, as a way of subjugating and committing them to perpetual servitude (Fitzpatrick 2012).

In comparison to their white counterparts, on average other ethnic groups are sending in 80% more job applications because of their names(BBC, 2018)



#### Naming Practices

The way some cultures give names:

- personal name, middle name, family name
- father's personal name: as a component of a child's full name;
- patronymic: name derived from personal name of father i.e. Johnson or MacDonald;
- grandfather's personal name: as a component of a grandchild's full name;
- Mother's paternal family name
- (honorific) title: a name or title given to, or used by, a person as a mark of status or respect;
- religious name: a name or title given to, or used by, a person according to the tradition of the person's religion.
- Clan name










#### Sounds/Letters

Tapping the person

Pointing

Replacing their name

#### What should SAY:

"Nice to meet you, Kaozara"

"I really want to make sure I say your name correctly, can you teach me?"

"Forgive me, could you remind me..."

Double check the name spelling

Correct other people

Ask for accents and tone markers
