Q&A Notes:

- Attendees noted the impact of the inspirational video. The importance of challenging students and getting them to challenge themselves; the positive impact of this. The great use of digital technology.
- Attendees noted the idea of 'out of adversity comes possibility'; 'taking risks and learning from failure'. This has much wider impact beyond performing arts.
- Discussion was held on the use of visual ice breakers to encourage students to participate on an on-line environment and how you could encourage students to use different backgrounds on MS teams.
- Students who were part of the presentation noted the difficulty of being on-line for prolonged periods and that sometimes it was useful to have the camera off.
- Discussion was held around the topic of playfulness and how this has enhanced the learning experience on-line. Playfulness has been more prevalent on-line than face to face. This approach has helped to break down hierarchal barriers between student and staff.
- Enhanced creativity has been achieved during Covid. This has been an empowering tool. It
 has connected students and staff. This connection has led to more inspiration and creativity.
- Artistic hierarchy has been broken down.
