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1. Introduction

2. N60044 BA (Hons) Human Resource Management

Leadership, Management & Marketing Board

2.1 In order for students on this programme to attain The Chartered Institute of Personnel and Development (CIPD) accreditation the following additional regulation is required:

Compensation

2.2 Compensation is not permitted for UG courses.

Regulatory Adjustments

- 2.3 To facilitate a student meeting the CIPD requirements, the following regulatory decisions will apply to students on the Human Resource Management programme specified:
 - Compensation will not be applied unless a student will fail the programme without compensation.
 - If at any stage compensation is applied, this will result in it not being possible for a student to meet the requirements of the CIPD accreditation, they will thereafter be assessed under the DMU regulations only and will therefore not be eligible for CIPD accreditation.
 - A student may request in writing to their Programme Leader to forsake CIPD
 accreditation and be considered under DMU only regulations going forward,
 allowing compensation as specified in DMU regulations. Once a student has
 opted to forsake CIPD accreditation, they cannot subsequently request
 reconsideration for CIPD accreditation.



3. N1N241 BA (Hons) Business Management February entry

- 3.1 In addition to being able to take a placement between levels 5 and 6 as per the standard regulations, a February entry student may also take a placement mid-Level 5 or Mid-level 6 after having completed their first two blocks of study at that level. On completion they will return to their last two blocks of study at the same level.
- 3.2 Proceeding to a placement mid-Level is as follows:
 - To undertake a placement starting mid-level 5 a student must normally have a successful complete level 4 profile and a provisional minimum mark of 30% in the module take in the first block of Level 5.
 - To undertake a placement starting mid-level 6 a student must normally have a successful complete level 4 and 5 profile.

- 4.2 A student can only be compensated in a maximum of one of the FLK core modules, provided that their mark for that module is at least 35.
- 4.3 The FLK core modules are:
 - English and European Legal Systems
 - Criminal Law
 - Contract Law
 - Constitutional and Administrative Law
 - Law of Tort
 - Land Law
 - Equity and Trusts



Regulatory Adjustments

4.4 To facilitate a student demonstrating a personal performance in their award that meets the expectations of The Bar or practice where the Seven Fundamentals of Legal Knowledge are required, the following regulatory decisions will apply to LLB students:

All levels

- The DMU regulation permitting compensation of 30 credits per level (subject to the conditions specified in the regulations) remains in place but with additional conditions placed on FLK core modules.
- Compensation of a FLK core module is not applied in the range 35 39% on the first attempt or first reassessment attempt unless all but one FLK core module (the module eligible for compensation) is already passed.
- Where compensation of a FLK module is possible on the final attempt under DMU regulations, compensation will be applied and the student will no longer meet the requirements of the Bar Standards and Seven Fundamentals of Legal Knowledge.
- If at any stage compensation for a FLK core module results in it not being

Fundamentals of Legal Knowledge (FLK) Requirements

Extra in-year Reassessment opportunity for Leicester College CertHE students

Extra in-year Reassessment opportunity for Leicester College HND students

- 6.1 Students who have passed all level 4 credits and 90 credits or more at level 5 with the remaining credits having been reassessed once will be offered the option of taking an exceptional second and final in-year reassessment for the failed credits, providing there is an in-year reassessment period with associated reassessment board remaining.

Due to the requirement that a student attain a minimum of 40% in any exam components to meet the requirements for ACCA exemptions, the following will apply.

Passing Exam Components

- 8.2 Where a student passes a module but attains less than 40% in the exam component, the student can request to be reassessed in the exam in order to improve the exam mark providing:
 - the student is not at their intended point of graduation and has not withdrawn/been withdrawn from the programme;
 - the student has not used up all their reassessment attempts for the module where not meeting the exam requirement is interpreted as failing the module for this purpose.
- 8.3 The overall module mark will not improve as a consequence of the exam being reassessed.
- 8.4 Such exam reassessment is normally to be taken when the next opportunity is provided by the faculty. A student may request exam reassessment at a later time in their studies (subject to the criteria previously detailed) but granting of such a request is subject to the continued availability of the exam component.

9. Legal Practice Course

Law - LPC/LLM Board

Solicitors Regulation Authority

Wide range of regulatory requirements

9.1 The current Academic Ordinances and Regulations of De Montfort University shall apply. If there is any conflict between the Academic Ordinances and Regulations and these regulations, these regulations shall prevail. If there is any conflict between the Academic Ordinances and Regulations and these regulations and the Solicitors Regulation Authority Legal Practice Course Assessment Requirements ("the Requirements"), the Requirements shall prevail.

Assessment Requirement

9.2 The Legal Practice Course is designed to lead to a University award of a Postgraduate Diploma in Legal Practice, consisting of 120 postgraduate credits.



9.3 The LLM Legal Practice Course is designed to lead to a University award of a Postgraduate LLM Legal Practice, consisting of 180 postgraduate credits.

Pass Requirement

- 9.4 The pass mark is 50% for all taught modules and the final project.
- 9.5 Students must take and pass all modules in Stage One and must take and pass three of the modules in Stage Two in order to obtain the award and to satisfy the SRA requirements.
- 9.6 The overall average mark is calculated using the Stage One modules for Business Law,
 Litigation and Property Law and the three Stage Two electives. Each module is
 equally weighted.
- 9.7 The award of LLM will be achieved by candidates who have successfully passed all the assessed elements (taught modules and the 60 credit final project), accumulating 180 credits on the Programme.

Exemptions (Recognition of Prior Learning/RPL)

Bar Vocational Course (BVC) or a Bar Professional Training Course (BPTC)

- 9.8 Students who have successfully completed either a **Bar Vocational Course (BVC) or a Bar Professional Training Course (BPTC)** within 5 years of registering on the programme are eligible for the following exemptions:
 - LGMP5003/5023/5043 Litigation
 - LGMPS004a/5024a/5044a Advocacy and Drafting
 - LGMP5004b/5024b/5044b Practical Legal Research (Previous BVC students only)
 - And up to 2 Electives.

Graduate Member of CILEX

- 9.9 Students who have successfully become a **Graduate Member of CILEx** before registering on the programme are subject to the following possible exemptions for which recognised prior learning can be used (up to a maximum of 50% of the programme):
 - GMPS000/5020/5040 Wills and Administration of Estates*
 *Students with an exemption will also be required to pass an exam in Tax.
 - LGMPS00I/5021/5041 Property Law and Practice
 - LGMP5002/5022/5042 Business and Law Practice**



- **Students with an exemption in LGMP5002/5022/5042 will also be required to pass an exam in both Business Accounts and Tax.

CILEx Graduate Fast-Track Diploma

- 9.10 Students who have successfully completed the CILEx Graduate Fast-Track Diploma as part of their academic training towards the overall Chartered Legal Executive qualification before registering on programme are subject to the following possible exemption:
 - LGMPS00I/5021/5041 Property Law and Practice

Final Dissertation (60 credit module)

- 9.11 To become eligible to submit a 10,000 word **Dissertation** a student is required to gain at least 60 credits from preceding modules.
- 9.12 It is imperative that the Faculty's 'Research Ethics' form is completed, submitted and signed off by the supervisor and the Dissertation Module Leader <u>prior</u> to the commencement of any research on a dissertation.
- 9.13 The first marker of the final project will normally be the candidate's academic supervisor. Internal moderation of final projects will be undertaken by internal markers appointed by the Programme Board. Thereafter a sample of dissertations will be made available to the External Examiners.
- 9.14 If a student passes all assessment units except the Dissertation, the Programme Board may, at its discretion, offer the candidate the possibility of re-presenting the Dissertation in a revised form without detriment to the pass achieved in the taught programme, within a timescale set by the Board.

Reassessment

- 9.15 Students have a maximum of **three** attempts on the LPC modules and **two** attempts at PLAW5610 Research Methods and PLAW5612 Dissertation.
- 9.16 A student who is unsuccessful on the **third** attempt of any **Stage One** assessment fails Stage Once overall. A student may re-register for Stage One of the course and **all** assessments must be retaken SUBJECT to the maximum registration period. A fee will be payable for re- taking Stage 1.



- 9.17 A student who is unsuccessful on the **third** attempt of a **Stage Two** assessment can either re-register for that particular elective module or start a fresh elective.
- 9.18 Reassessment is permitted in relation to fail marks only. Once a reassessment has been successfully completed students will receive full credits for the module but their grade will be capped at 50%.
- 9.19 If you have to undertake reassessment outside your current Academic Year you will need to keep up to date with the law. It is your responsibility to do this and to check whether any new materials have been issued to students.
- 9.20 Failing to attend a reassessment will be deemed as a failure of that attempt.

 Submission of work after deadline dates will normally be deemed a fail in the respective assessment unit, unless the student has been granted a deferral.
- 9.21 Candidates will only be allowed to commence reassessed work <u>after</u> the Programme Assessment Board has met to formally ratify the decision. All candidates with reassessments will receive an email after each Programme Assessment Board meeting confirming the exact details of the reassessment. You are also strongly advised to contact the Module Leader for additional support.

Pass with Distinction

LMM

- 9.29 For a LLM Legal Practice degree, a **merit** may be awarded if:
 - The criteria for the Legal Practice with merit is met and
 - The dissertation is at merit level (60% or above)

Failure to Achieve the Requirements for the PG Diploma in Legal Practice

9.30 The Programme Assessment Board will fail candidates where they have no further reassessment opportunities available. Candidates are advised to speak to the Course Director for advice about this.
