events as an audience member over
the first 10 years of its existence,
so it gives me particular pleasure
now to provide a foreword to the
2012 programme in my new role
as Pro Vice Chancellor / Dean
for the Faculty of Art, Design and
Humanities.

The creation of this faculty in summer 2011 demonstrates the university's positive commitment to the value of cultural education and the humanities tradition at a time when university funding reforms and the reductions in support to the arts are sending out quite different signals. The Festival continues to be organised and managed by final year Arts and Festival Management undergraduates. Notably, one of the highlights of this year is the world-renowned choreographer, Matthew Bourne, who will be featured 'In Conversation' on stage in the main auditorium at Leicester's Curve Theatre. This is just one instance of the close association of the School of Arts with Curve and with other professional arts venues and organisations within the city. These partnerships give our students the opportunity to meet the demands in the world of employment as part of their university studies and they increase the outreach and accessibility of Cultural Exchanges.

We are also looking forward to the contributions from the renowned photographer Eamonn McCabe; and Hugh McILvanney, the highly regarded sports journalist, especially since the Faculty has a strong reputation both for journalism and for research in Sports History and Cultures. I am also particularly excited to hear Melissa Benn's talk, 'School Wars', which will discuss her campaign for a fairer comprehensive state education system. There are too many performances and speakers to list here, and, as ever, the programme will provide something of interest for everyone across the 40 events on offer.

I look forward to welcoming you to this year's Festival and I thank you for your interest in this very special undertaking by our students.


# Jamaican Independence 50th Anniversary Event Kerry Young In Conversation 5 – 6pm





# Professor Richard Evans Why Germany Lost the Second World War

This illuminating talk looks at military strategy, economic performance and morale as factors in Germany's defeat by the Allies in World War II. Hitler's war aims involved the complete racial reordering of Europe, including the annihilation of the Jews, as a springboard for war with the USA and world domination. Defeat was inevitable in view of these limitless aims. Richard J Evans is Regius Professor of History and President of Wolfson College, University of Cambridge. His books include The Third Reich at War (Penguin, 2008).

Author of 8 books of poetry, part of the Next Generation (2004), the first Welsh Poet Laureate and Vice President of the Poetry Society, Lewis takes a funnyserious approach to topics that range from space exploration to the 2011 Welsh mining disaster. Her writing on depression won a Mental Health in the Media award and her epic on cancer, A Hospital Odyssey, was Times Book of the Year 2010.






