


STAYING SAFE AT UNIVERSITY

- Contents insurance
- List of possessions including the make, model and serial numbers and photographic records of valuables
- Visibly mark possessions with your name and student ID number
- Register valuables free at www.immobilise.com
- Map of campus to get around safely
- Service times for any night time buses, trains and local taxi firm numbers and apps
- Steering wheel lock
- Timer switch
- D-Lock for your bicycle
- UK Bank or building society account to keep your cash secure rather than lying around
- List of emergency contacts and bank phone numbers in case your cards are lost or stolen
- Ensure your details (including next of kin contacts) are up to date with university staff

PERSONAL SAFETY

DON'T GET IN A PICKLE BY MAKING YOURSELF AN EASY TARGET...



After dark, keep to well-lit, populated areas that you are familiar with

Cover up jewellery with a scarf or clothing

- Keep bags closed, zipped up and buckled with the clasps facing inwards
- Carry your wallet, phone and other valuables out of sight
- Be wary of who is around you at cash machines.
 If in doubt, move on
 - Be aware of your surroundings and if you are worried you are being followed, change direction, go into a shop or pub and call the police
- Be careful of chatting on your phone or listening to music, particularly at night when this can distract you from what is happening around you
- Never accept a drink from a stranger and always leave your drink with someone you can trust
- After a night out on the SAUCE, book a cab or organise to walk home with friends. Keep some local taxi numbers in your phone or download their apps

On a date and feeling uncomfortable?

BIKE SECURITY

WE KNOW YOU'RE KEEN AS MUSTARD TO GET TO YOUR LECTURES BUT MAKE SURE YOUR BIKE IS SECURE BEFORE YOU LEAVE IT!

Remove detachable accessories such as lights, pumps and quick release saddles Mark the frame with your postcode in two areas, one of which should be hidden

At home, keep your bike in a locked shed or garage if possible or a locked room

BIKE PASSPORT Lock your bike using Secure your bike to a D-lock through a fixed object or bike both the frame and

the back wheel if possible

rack in a well-lit, busy area and avoid lampposts

Fill in a bike passport which your local police officer can provide. If it's stolen, all the bike details will be there for insurers and police

VEHICLE SECURITY

- Park in well-lit areas or areas covered by CCTV where possible, or even in a garage
- Make sure all your vehicles' windows and doors are left secure at all times
- Do not leave valuables on view in your vehicle at any time and remove them where possible
- If you have a keyless car, use a signal blocker
- Never leave your keys in the ignition on icy mornings, or when paying for petrol
- Get a car alarm, steering lock/tracker or immobiliser fitted


HOME SECURITY


TRY NOT TO MAKE IT OBVIOUS YOUR PROPERTY IS LIVED IN BY STUDENTS...

- Burglars target student properties because they know they are most likely to have many expensive items worth pinching
 - Don't leave valuables or cash lying around in full sight. Keep them in a safe place
- Close curtains or blinds at night or when going out in the evening. Make sure your house looks occupied after dark by leaving lights on or using an automatic timer
 - Insure your possessions take photos and write down serial numbers. It's cheaper to insure than replace your stuff
- Don't leave packaging from expensive items outside your house. Take it to be recycled or put it in the bin
- Keep your windows and doors locked at all times, even when in the property, when you're going upstairs or popping out – even for a minute. Remove the key from the lock

Going away for the weekend or longer? Make sure your doors and windows are locked and valuables are out of sight.





ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

UNIVERSITIES TAKE A DIM VIEW OF REPORTS OF ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR FROM THEIR STUDENTS. DON'T JEOPARDISE YOUR DEGREE FOR THE SAKE OF A PARTY!

Walking home doesn't have to sound like a herd of elephants. Keep it down!

Don't advertise a party on social media – it can quickly get out of hand

CYBER SECURITY

DON'T LEAVE YOURSELF PLAYING KETCHUP. YOU COULD LOSE ALL YOUR HARD WORK TO A WEAK PASSWORD!

- Never leave your laptop or tablet unattended in the library or your car
- Back up your work regularly and disguise your laptop in a rucksack so people don't know you are carrying one
- Don't open emails or attachments if you don't know where they came from
- Be aware of scam emails which may ask you for personal details or money
- Keep your bank cards safe along with PINS, passwords and personal information. Never include personal information in your passwords!

What goes online stays online and could be seen by anybody – including potential employers!

DID YOU KNOW...

Your bank would never ask you to disclose your password or PIN in full.

If something seems too good to be true, it probably is...
