Entry requirements for qualified nurses

- You must be a qualified nurse
- If English is not your first language, an IELTS overall score of 6.5 or equivalent, is essential
- You should possess 120 credits at levels four and five, or equivalent, that have not previously been counted towards a degree award
- International students must have leave to enter or remain in the UK that permits study, and will be valid for the duration of the course, such as a Tier 4 (General) visa, prior to enrolment
- or INST 200 Transition to UK academic study

If you want UK registration

- You will also require registration with a recognised regulatory organisation in your home country
- You must provide an appropriate employer or academic reference within the past two years
- You will be required to undertake an interview
- If you choose to undertake the Overseas Nursing module, IELTS 7.0 is essential in reading, listening, writing and speaking
- If you choose to undertake the EU Nursing Adaptation module, IELTS 7.0 is essential and evidence of study within five years

All applicants must complete an occupational health check, declaration form and enhanced DBS disclosure application before starting the course. All overseas students must submit a criminal records certificate from their home country, which needs to be cleared in accordance with DMU's admissions policy.
