3. Course Description

Characteristics and Aims

This course aims to help students to:

- a) Understand the history and current state of journalism
- b) Critically analyse key debates and issues in journalism
- c) Develop the range of skills necessary to interact in/with 21st century journalism
- d) Sit professional NCTJ qualifications

The practical modules will progress students through the key journalistic skills.

A key factor in the course will be work experience which the students will be expected to carry

out in each of their summer vacations. Work experience will enable them to practise and hone their skills.

The Media Law and Public Affairs modules will equip students with a broad knowledge of the environment in which journalism functions.

The theoretical modules will allow students to start to explore the key issues and controversies in contemporary journalism. The dissertation module allows students to explore, in depth, an important area of journalism of interest to them, using appropriate research methods.

Students will choose one from a selection of five optional modules to make up their total of four final year modules.

The course is designed to blend the theory and practice of journalism, to encourage critical analysis and reflective practice and so produce a deep understanding of the power, the responsibility and the skills of modern journalism.

Teaching, Learning and Assessment Strategies

Learning takes place in a variety of formats including workshops, practicals, lectures, seminars, tutorials and independent study.
